Update Schedule Review

Submittal – Submittal is current and includes all required schedule components.
□ Schedule Printout Including All Activities□ Oracle P6 Schedule File (*.xer)
Data Date – Data date is on or near the submittal date.
Narrative – Narrative included and provides required information.
Milestone Dates ☐ Project Completion – Project finish on or before contract completion date. ☐ Interim Completion – Interim completion dates finish on or before contract dates. ☐ Limited Duration Closures – All closures open within allowable timeframe.
Actual Dates – Activity progress includes accurate actual start and actual finish dates.
Schedule Changes – Changes in schedule activities, relationships, durations accurately reflect contract modifications and/or changes to the project plan.
Comparison Reports – Comparison reports reviewed for progress, trends, and unexpected delays.
Calendars – Alterations or changes to the calendar. ☐ Work Week (days/week, hours/day) – Work week matches the contractor's plan. ☐ Multiple Calendars – All calendars assigned to appropriate activities. ☐ Holiday Work Restrictions – Holiday work restrictions in appropriate calendars. ☐ Adverse Weather Days – Adverse weather days incorporated into calendar.
Date Constraints – Date constraints only assigned to contract milestones. Added / Deleted / Modified constraints accurately represent project changes.
Work Breakdown Structure (WBS) – WBS is logical, and schedule is easy to read. Milestones Staging Roadway Structures Sitework Traffic Control WBS Modified for Added/Deleted Scopes of Work as Needed WBS Name Changes
Activity Names – Activity names clearly describe scope of work to be performed. Activity name modifications do not change activity scope of work.

	Number of Activities – Breakdown of activities appropriate for size and complexity of project. Added/Deleted Activities for Contract Modifications, Delays, or Claims
	Activity Durations – Durations are appropriate for the scope and production rates provided. □ Duration changes accurately represent status of the activity.
	Relationship Checks – Sequence of activities is logical and appropriate for the work to be performed Added / Deleted / Modified relationships accurately depict changes to the contract and/or the contractor's plan.
	Contract Change Orders – Contract changes accurately incorporated into the schedule update. Added / Deleted / Modified Scopes of Work
	Delays / Impacts – Delays or impacts added to the schedule and detailed in the schedule narrative.
	Critical Paths – Critical paths to interim and final completion are appropriate for anticipated sequences. □ Progress or lack thereof on the critical paths from the previous update.
	Activity Float – Activity float is within guidelines.
	☐ Total Float – Maximum and minimum total float values are appropriate for scopes of work.
	☐ Negative Float – Update schedule negative float reflects delays or impacts.
	 Percent Critical or Near Critical – Schedule contains appropriate amount of critical or near critical activities.
	Excess Float – Float values are not excessive; schedule includes appropriate relationships.
	☐ Float Sequestration – Scheduling techniques not used to hide or override total float values.
	 Float changes from baseline or previous update reflect progress or lack thereof on activity sequences.
	Activity Logs – Activity log information reviewed for notes or claims not included in the narrative or CPM schedule.
